LIBRARIES AND ACCESS TO JUSTICE: Libraries as Crucial Partners

A Role for Libraries in Access to Justice

- There are 16,536 public libraries in the United States, nearly all of which offer free public access to computers, the Internet, and to trained staff equipped to help library patrons access information.
- Librarians in law schools, bar association libraries, and court libraries have expertise that would be valuable to low-income people seeking legal information, but these entities are typically not as familiar, or have the same accessibility, to lowincome individuals, as public libraries.
- With proper training and support, public librarians could help a significant number of Americans who qualify for LSC-funded legal aid, but are turned away due to lack of resources.






Public Librarian Training Resources

Chapter 6: The Michigan Legal Help Website and Additional Resources

Introduction

MichiganLegalHelp.org is an interactive website built to enable self-represented persons to handle relatively simple civil legal matters on their own. This project of the Michigan Poverty Law Program (MPLP) is funded by a grant from the Michigan State Bar Foundation (MSBF) and was originally a project of the Solutions on Self-Help Taskforce (SOSTF). The SOSTF was created in April 2010 by (then) Michigan Supreme Court Chief Justice Marilyn Kelley to promote greater centralization, coordination, and quality of support for self-represented litigants in Michigan.

This website includes legal information and forms covering a variety of legal subject areas, currently including consumer, family, protection from abuse, housing, expungement, public benefits, and income taxes. Users can complete several of the forms by answering questions in a simple interview format; the interviews and forms are programmed so the answers complete the forms selected by the user. The site also provides self-represented people with jurisdiction-specific procedural instructions. These instructions guide users through the steps they need to take after completing their forms, and give them an idea of what to expect once they get to court. In addition, the website is a clearinghouse for referrals



Next Steps

- LSC plans to:
 - Seek funding to develop the training
 - Partner with OCLC/WebJunction, an organization that provides cost-effective training and staff development programs for librarians, to design and build the curriculum.
 - Seek input from the American Library Association (ALA); Cleveland Public Library; the Public Library Association (PLA), a subset of ALA; and the American Association of Law Librarians (AALL).
 - Engage with legal partners such as for their input and endorsement of the project.

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
