


10th Annual Homeless Resource Day | Glen Burnie High School October 28, 2017

Anne Arundel County's 10th Annual Homeless Resource Day was held on October 28, 2017 at Glen Burnie High School. Homeless Resource Day is a "one-day, one-stop" opportunity for individuals and families experiencing homelessness to access benefits, medical care, substance abuse resources, mental health counseling intake and other social services, which can ultimately lead to stable housing and self-sufficiency.


On this day, the weather could not have been more perfect, with clear skies and warm temperatures. This year, 295 volunteers, including 82 USNA Midshipmen, arrived ready to help homeless individuals and families connect to resources and benefits. This was our lowest volunteer turn out in the 10 years of the event. Yet each homeless guest did receive a volunteer to guide them through the 61 participating service providers with services ranging from haircuts, vital documents, insurance, and medical care.

Over six hours, 384 guests were served at Homeless Resource Day including 331 adults and 53 children. The Junior League of Annapolis entertained the children with games, coloring, and activities. Guests came from all over Anne Arundel County as far south as Annapolis. The majority were from Glen Burnie (47%), Brooklyn (11%) and Annapolis (17%). Additionally, due to the event's proximity to Baltimore City, (6%) homeless guests from the city received services and remaining 19% from other areas of Anne Arundel County.



Homeless Resource Day services people from many different housing situations. The majority of the guests were living in shelter (24%) or with family and friends (26%). The county's four shelters, Light House, Sarah's House, Arundel House of Hope's Winter Relief and Arden House (YWCA) transported their guests to the event. Forty individuals experiencing homelessness were living outside in places not meant for habitation such as tents, vehicles and abandoned buildings. The event saw an increase in the number of individuals and families living in their own apartment, with 24% reporting having their own place and requiring assistance to maintain their housing and preventing eviction.


Living Situation



A turkey chili lunch was provided by the Anne Arundel County Food and Resource Bank and The Light House. The staff from Baltimore-Washington International Airport served lunch to our guest. Morning snacks for guests were provided by the Anne Arundel County Food and Resource Bank and the Anne Arundel Alarmer's Association provided free breakfast food for volunteers and service providers from their rehab and canteen vehicle. Woods Memorial Church in Severna Park provided over 400 bagged "take home" lunches for guests. The Assistance League of the Chesapeake was located at the event's exit; volunteers there passed out toiletry items, blankets from Project Linus and bagged take home lunches.

Prior to this year's event, guest participation at Homeless Resource Day has decreased at each of the last five years (see Fig. 1). Turnout this year reversed this downward trend, but was still lower than expected. Last year at Brooklyn Park Middle School, Homeless Resource Day served 341 guests. While this year there was a 13% increase in attendance.





Improved client outreach by community service providers, the unseasonably warm weather, the Glen Burnie location, and enhanced support/case management provided by the county's new Homeless Street Outreach Team leading up to the event are likely factors in the increased participation this year compared to 2016.
